Pershing Women Honored at NATCON 2017

Sandra Pershing Delivers Keynote **Address**



On March 9 – 12, 2017, members of the Pershing family from across the country came together for the annual National Convention and General Assembly in Jacksonville, Florida. This year's event had the largest attendance in recent history. and included a historic celebration—Honoring Pershing Women, and the Contribution of Women in the Armed Forces.

At Thursday's National Alumni Dinner, the Pershing Rifles Group recognized the first of three special guests of honor. Ms. Darlene Evans Williams became the first woman to become a member of Pershing Rifles in 1972, pledging Company L-4, located at North Carolina State University. At the time, the military has just recently phased out restrictions on women participating as candidates in the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), and there was not yet a change in Pershing Rifles policy nationally, but Darlene continued to pursue membership in the



The weekend festivities began with the Alumni Dinner at the Lexington Hotel and Conference Center Thursday evening.


On Friday 10 March, the Drill Competition commenced with an Inspection of the Troops. The reviewing officer was Rear Adm. Bette Bolivar, commander, Navy Region Southeast. Thereafter the drill competition was held in which Troop L-1 from the University of Toledo emerged as the "Varsity Rifles" Pershing Rifles National Drill Champions for the Fifth consecutive year.

On Saturday morning which began early, the Pershing Rifles Group Joint Meeting which was well attended. Later the Society's legislative meeting which was held behind closed doors as is the tradition and ended with a vote to elect P/R MG Alex Meier as National Commander. Later Pershing Riflemen toured Jacksonville and visited the local beaches.

The evening ended with a reception and the annual military style formal dinner and awards ceremony at the Lexington Hotel & Conference Center - Jacksonville Riverwalk. Naval Air Station Jacksonville Sailors Judge Pershing Rifles Drill Competition

Fifteen Naval Air Station (NAS) Jacksonville Sailors participated as judges for the National Society of Pershing Rifles John J. Pershing Memorial Competition in Jacksonville, March 10.

The competition included solo, duet, squad, color guard and platoon exhibitions from high school and university drill units from all over the country, with demonstrations from partner organizations including the National Society of Pershing Angels, National Society of Blackjacks and the National Society of Pershing Rifles Alumni Association.

"We have about 20 schools represented here from all over the country," said Carrie Ann Viscanti, a junior at Hofstra University and the officer in charge of the event. "They are all competing against each other in a memorial drill competition in order to remember General John J. Pershing."

The majority of the judges had participated in similar programs when they were in high school, including GM3 Amber Harvey, who is assigned to NAS Jacksonville's security department.

"When I was in ROTC, we had nationals similar to this, where I twirled the rifle and everything," said Harvey, who judged the solo exhibition and has four years of JROTC experience. "I think judging today was a good opportunity because I had past experience. From what I can recall from personal experience, it's very nerve wracking. But this is a really big deal to them, they all have great military bearing, and they all take it very seriously."

ITCM Gabriel Sermeno agreed and said he enjoyed giving back to a program which helped him.

"Today has been the culmination of a very long road to get here," said Dillon Overton, a junior at Clemson University. "We have been practicing all year. C-8 Re-chartered at NATCON '17

Congratulations to our newest Pershing Rifles unit, Company C-8, University of Maryland which was presented their charter at the NATCON '17 Formal Dinner on 11 March.



Company C-8 is one of the oldest P/R units, receiving its original charter in 1934 as Company C-5. Its designation changed again in the 1959-60 school year when it became part of the new 15th Regiment and was named Squadron C-15 as the majority of its members were from Air Force ROTC. A few months later it was re-designated as Squadron A-15. It disappeared from the rolls of active Pershing Rifles units In the midst of the Vietnam War in 1968.

From the 1934 to 1968 the Company was an institution on campus reaching out to the community by hosting many blood drives and an annual canned goods drive.


In 1952 it had a highpoint of 190 members. The unit served as the official color guard for home football games and as honor guard for numerous dignitaries. It conducted a special retreat ceremony following the death of President John F. Kennedy.

It competed in numerous drill competitions winning Pershing Rifles National Champions for two consecutive years in the early 1960s. It also competed in several rifle matches.

Outgoing National Commander Promoted to P/R Lieutenant General

Color Guard at Formal Dinner

Company G-10 California Baptist University



For the second year in a row, the California Baptist University Army ROTC women's squad won first place in the color guard event at the John J. Pershing Memorial Drill Competition in Jacksonville, Florida. The men's team also repeated their previous year's performance with a third place finish in the same event.

The competition, held in March, pitted 42 programs against each other in several categories, including squad regulation drill, platoon exhibition drill, individual drill and color guard.

The winning CBU team included returning cadets Shannon Garcia, Sheraya Bentick, Imelda Camaja and newcomer Amanda Tetreault. The men's team included returning cadets Kendall Morris and Joshua Fink along with new additions Nathan Tucker and Brandan Walker.

Tetreault said the event was a learning and rewarding experience.

"Knowing that they had already won first place put a lot of pressure on [me], but it was good pressure," Tetreault said. "In the end, it made us practice harder and go there with determination."

Two of the women cadets are graduating in the spring, so the event took on a greater meaning for the team, Bentick said.

"Even though we wanted first place, at the end of the day, it's not completely about winning first place," Bentick said. "Whether we win or lose, whether we mess up or do great, this is our last experience together so let's make it count."

The cadets put hours of practice and attention to detail, said Sgt. 1st Class Jason Winkle, military science instructor.

"It all comes down to precision. These [cadets] don't accept anything less than perfection," Winkle said.

Tucker said it was a challenge learning all the commands in order for the team's seven-minute routine.

"You don't necessarily have time to react once the commands are called, you have to know what the next movement is," Tucker said.

This is the fourth consecutive year CBU teams have returned from the competition with awards. In 2015, the men's team also placed third in the color guard event and 2014, the men's team took first place in the same category.

"We have developed a name for ourselves," Winkle said.

ASU Pershing Rifles Have Another Strong Showing at the Nationals

On March 9 Pershing Rifle Company M-4 set out to Jacksonville, Florida for Pershing Rifles National Convention and Competition (NATCON 2017). Twenty-seven Pershing Rifleman and advisor Captain Brown attended from the Mountaineer Battalion. The entire event had over 300 Pershing Rifleman, Pershing Angels, and Black Jacks in attendance from all over the country.

NATCON's first event was the John J. Pershing Memorial Drill Competition. Company M-4 competed in every event which was platoon and squad regulation drill, platoon, and squad exhibition, duet exhibition, individual exhibition, and color guard. M-4 walked away with a second place trophy in platoon regulation, commanded by Benjamin Ramirez, and a third place trophy in squad regulation, commanded by Brett Aldridge. Two individuals in M-4 were also recognized at the awards ceremony. Troy Jones received the Bronze Achievement Medal, and Sam Boyles received the Silver Achievement Medal.

After the drill competition, the society met up for a social at the Black Fin Pub where current Pershing Riflemen and alumni socialized. It was a good opportunity for the society to experience exactly what it was all about, brotherhood.

The next day is when legislative and informative meetings were held. These meetings ranged from company commanders meeting with the national staff to discuss the future of the society to updated policies on subjects such as hazing.

Later that night the formal dinner took place where many honors were given. M-4 was recognized three different times for Best Company, the Gold Achievement Medal (given to Phillip Wagner), and Jeremy Tuggle received a scholarship for \$2,000. That night the honored guest speaker was the granddaughter-in-law of General Pershing, Sandra Pershing. She is the last surviving person that bears the name Pershing. The rest of the evening the society celebrated another successful year for NATCON.

organization, working with the Company L-4 to petition the Pershing Rifles National Headquarters at the University of Nebraska. The petition was approved, allowing Darlene to compete alongside over 30 of her male counterparts--ultimately resulting in Darlene becoming the first woman to be initiated into the National Society of Pershing Rifles. Darlene was recognized as an Honorary Members of the PRG Board of Directors, and awarded the Order of Pershing at the Thursday event.

The second honoree was recognized at the formal dinner on Saturday night. In June of 2016, Captain Deshauna Barber became the first woman actively serving in the United States Armed Forces to be crowned Miss USA. Deshauna has been a passionate supporter of the men and women in the U.S. military, and as Miss USA, is focusing her efforts on PTSD treatment for soldiers returning from deployments, as well as suicide prevention in the Armed Forces. She is a member of the National Society of Pershing Angels. Deshauna has worked previously as an IT Analyst for the U.S. Department of Commerce, and is a Logistics Commander in the Army Reserve for the 988th Quartermaster Detachment Unit at Rockville, Maryland. Captain Kia Booker accepted the recognition and delivered remarks on Deshauna's behalf. Kia and Deshauna pledged Pershing Angels Company O-4 located Virginia State University.

The 2017 National Convention culminated with the recognition of Mrs. Sandra Sinclair Pershing, the granddaughter in law of General of the Armies John J. Pershing. Mrs. Pershing delivered the keynote address at the formal dinner. She currently serves as a director emeritus for the Pershing Foundation, and a special advisor to the World War I Centennial Commission. As an advisor to the Commission, she has fought tirelessly to ensure the veterans of World War I are honored with a national memorial in our nation's capital. In addition, she is a volunteer at Phoenix House, where she provides support to the organization's efforts to help combat PTSD and other military service related injuries. Ms. Pershing also works with the board of the Women's Prison Association, an organization that helps women rebuild their lives and families throughout all stages of the criminal justice system.

Anti-Hazing Policy

The National Society of Pershing Rifles will not tolerate ANY hazing, especially in the initiation procedures for any Pershing Rifles pledges at any chartered Pershing Rifles unit. This applies to both mental and physical hazing.

Hazing is defined as any conduct whereby one Pershing Rifleman, regardless of rank, causes another member or pledge to suffer or be exposed to an activity that is cruel, abusive, humiliating, or oppressive. Hazing includes, but is not limited to, any form of initiation or congratulatory act that involves physically striking another to inflict pain, piercing another's skin in any manner, encouraging another to excessively consume alcohol, or encouraging another to engage in illegal, harmful, demeaning or dangerous acts. In addition to physical contact, hazing can also be verbal or psychological in nature.

If at any time a Pershing Rifleman or pledge, regardless of rank, finds a violation to this directive, he or she is to report the violation to the National Commander. A Pershing Rifleman active or alumni who have been found guilty of hazing will be stripped of all rank and rights of a Pershing Rifleman, and will be subject to permanent expulsion from the Society and considered for legal action.

So it is up to each and every one of us to work hard each day to help improve the society. If we can do this we can take Pershing Rifles further than anyone believed possible.

The First Pershing Rifles Membership Ribbons

When Lieutenant Pershing left the University of Nebraska in 1895 he, at the request of a committee representing Varsity Rifles, gave the unit a pair of his cavalry breeches. The breeches were cut into small pieces and were worn on the uniform as a sign of membership. These "ribbons" were thought to be the first service ribbons worn in the United States.

"We met in his room one night to organize and 'The Lieut,' as we familiarly called the Instructor—he was a second lieutenant then—asked what colors we wanted on our badges. PERSHING RIFLES ALUMNI WHO HAVE PASSED


Captain Robert Lee Bragg, 79, Harrisonburg, Virginia, 14 September 1937 - 9 February 2017. Founded Company G-4 at Auburn University, US Air Force pilot 1959-64. On 27 March 1977, while a first officer with Pan Am, Captain Bragg was in the world's worst commercial aviation accident at Tenerife, Canary Islands. Captain Bragg's B-747 was struck while on the runway by another B-747 belonging to KLM. In all, 583 died. For his efforts in assisting fellow crewmembers and passengers, Robert Bragg received the President's Award for Heroism. He also received the FAA's Achievement Award. the highest award that the FAA can bestow on a civilian pilot, and the Flight Safety Foundation's Award for Actions during the accident. He also flew the first military charter flights during Operation Desert Storm.

Colonel (Ret) James Maurice Drake II, 69, of Montpelier, Ohio. October 22, 1946 - June 7, 2016. Company R-1, Eastern Kentucky University. Served in Vietnam as a Helicopter Pilot, retired in 1995, with more than 26 years of military service as an Aviation and Field Artillery Officer.

Henry ("Hank") Nettling, 81, born in Nagyszekely, Hungary and came to Akron in 1947, he passed away on March 26, 2017 Company D-1, University of Akron. US Army Reserve 1959-71 with the rank of Captain. Worked for nearly 39 years at The University of Akron, as Controller, and retired as Vice President Emeritus for Business and Finance in 2002.

William (Bill) Harvey O'Connor, III, 76, Towson, NC, July 22, 1941 - March 18, 2017. Company E-15 (now P-8) Johns Hopkins University. Marched in the inaugural parade of John F. Kennedy. US Army Ordinance Corps 1964-66. Worked for 38 years for the Black and Decker Corporation receiving five patents and retiring in 2002 as Vice President of Engineering Operations of the North American Power Tool Group.


